Dear Veterans and all Members,

It's been a proud six months for 47 RM Commando Association – from the award of the Legion d'Honneur to all Veterans, to the choice of Port en Bessin as the focus of the International Commemoration of D-Day. When Veterans first started the Association they never thought that one day their comrades would get the highest award for valour in France or that the world would come to Port en Bessin to hear of their exploits. We know that when John Forfar wrote his history of the unit, there were still people in Normandy who thought that the Americans had liberated P en B. So it was very moving to stand there in the Port with so many friends from all countries and see our 47 Veterans and their standard carried by Lou Sartorel.

Thanks go to the Mayor and his wife who were our guests at the Royal Albert Hall back in the spring. We were glad to present them with a print of *The Festival of the Sea* painted by the late Ted Battley of B Troop, donated by his wife, Lannah, and framed by his brother-in-law Fred Fearne. Our Secretary Ingrid balanced the itinerary perfectly to get us all there on time. The Padre, John Wasley has been learning French and led very moving services before hundreds of us. The town asked Marc de Bolster to host another Vehicle Parade and he did this to great applause and has earned us many new friends. Geof Haywood organised our ceremonies and liaised with the serving Royal Marines who attended in strength and Ken Cowdery led many of us on the walk from Asnelles – and we raised £1200 by sponsoring the miles we walked. The 47 Bar has a new and enthusiastic patron in Pascal and members made sure to break his rule of no singing or drinking without food in the main bar!

As serving Marines backed out of the Port in a modern day landing craft on the evening of the 7th June, the whole party stood on the Quay singing "We'll Meet Again". I feel sure we

will all be back on parade soon. – With France again under attack from terrorism, the sight of our Veterans who came across the sea under bombardment to liberate them, must still remain a great inspiration.

NORMANDY 2016
International Recognition for 47 Royal Marine Commando

Although it was not expected that the 72nd anniversary of the Normandy D-Day landings would match the fitting programme of commemoration experienced two years ago, 2016 proved to be equally memorable.

This year, the Comité du Débarquement (D-Day Commemoration Committee) decided that the annual international ceremony would be held on 6 June in Port-en-Bessin, the vital oil-port liberated by 47 RM Cdo on D-Day +1. This was the first time that the internationally respected committee had held the ceremony at a location outside the main British, US or Canadian D-Day sectors. It was therefore a significant honour for the town, our veterans, the 47 RM Cdo Association and the Royal Marines. The prestigious event was attended by a French Government minister, eight National ambassadors and military attachés with DCGRM (Brig Spencer OBE ADC) and the Corps RSM (WO1(RSM) Gilby RM) leading a strong contingent of serving Royal Marines which included: CO (Col Armour) and RSM

(WO1(RSM) Davitt RM) along with personnel and a landing craft from 1 Assault Group RM, Royal Marines Reserve City of London Honorary Colonel (Col Hatt-Cook OBE RD*) accompanied by the CO (Lt Col Moorhouse RM), the Royal Marines Reserve RSM (WO1(RSM) Campbell RM) with other reservist and permanent staff.

One of the important aim's of the Comité du Débarquement is to pass



down to younger generations what the fight for freedom in June 1944 was about and prior to the ceremony secondary school students from Port-en-Bessin, Longues-sur-Mer and Bayeux

met with our veterans, Norman Rose, Ken Parker, Harry Prescott and Chuck Harris, to listen to their stories and ask questions.

Amidst tight security the main ceremony commenced at 1600 hours, enough time for those participating in the 12-mile commemorative walk, following the route that the Commando marched in 1944 from Gold Beach at Asnelles to Port-en-Bessin, to rejoin other Association members, families and veterans inside the event arena on the sea front. Following the national anthems and flag raising, each ambassador paid handsome tribute to the high achievement of 47 RM Cdo before one of our veterans, Harry Prescott, led the laying of wreaths at the Monument du Port Petrolier. The reception which followed in the Salle des Fêtes was a mix of remembrance, hospitality and friendship and was an opportunity for our Chairman, Paddy O'Connell, to thank the Mayor, Pierre-Albert Cavey, for his ongoing support to the Association and to Jean-Marie Lefranc, President of the Comité du Débarquement.

The liberation of Port-en-Bessin is commemorated by the local community and 47 RM Cdo Association on 7 June. The first ceremony was at the 47 RM Cdo Memorial Garden on the Western Feature overlooking the harbour. The service of remembrance was led by Rev John Wasley RNR with Bugler Dave Nevatte sounding the Last Post. The large gathering, including DCGRM and Royal Marines who had supported us the day previously, then transferred to the Captain Terence Cousins Memorial on the Eastern Feature for a

similar service. Captain Cousins is recognised as playing the decisive role in the battle of Port-en-Bessin; his outstanding qualities of leadership, determination, initiative and courage that he displayed during the attack on the enemy fortifications, near where the memorial now stands,



continue to be an inspiration to the current generation of serving Royal Marines. We were fortunate to be joined by Essie Cousins, niece of Captain Cousins, and her brother David and his family from New Zealand, who laid a wreath in honour of the gallant troop commander who lost his life leading his men in battle. A further ceremony followed at the bunker in Place Gaudin and an opportunity to also remember those French civilians who, as the battle for the port raged around them and while the outcome was still unknown, gave so much assistance to the wounded of 47 RM Cdo and took them into their homes despite the threat of reprisals.

During the the post ceremonies reception in the Salle des Fêtes, Harry and fellow veteran Chuck Harris were presented with the Legion d'Honneur, a most fitting way to round off what had been a very special and momentous couple of days. This was followed by a spectacular cavalcade through the town of historic military vehicles with their owners and crews all dressed in WW2 military uniform.

The following morning was spent visiting Bayeux War Cemetery, the final resting place for forty-two men of the Commando killed during the D-Day assault, the approach march and subsequent battle for Port-en-Bessin. We were joined for the short Service of Remembrance, Last Post and wreath laying by the girls from St George's School, Ascot, who afterwards

were keen to chat to the veterans and hear first hand of their wartime experiences. Later that day we travelled to Sallenelles and viewed the recently refurbished memorial to 4th Special Service Brigade - the memorial honours the men of Brigade HQ, 41 RM Cdo, 46 RM Cdo, 47 RM Cdo and 48 RM Cdo who gave their lives during the defence of the River Orne bridgehead.

After a long day on the road veterans, families and friends all looked forward to the traditional Association dinner in our affiliated bar, Le 47eme, named in honour of 47 RM Cdo. The proprietor, Pascal (a former French paratrooper) and his staff, looked after us superbly and, as an added bonus, we were joined by the Mayor and his charming wife Béatrice.

The 2016 visit to Normandy would not have been such an outstanding success without the hard work of so many people; in particular a special thanks to Association members Geof Haywood (our Chef des Ceremonies), Ken Cowdery (commemorative march director), Lou Sartorel (standard bearer), Rev John Wasley RNR (chaplain), Paddy O'Connell (linguist, raconteur and chairman), and last but not least to our indefatigable secretary, Ingrid Fearne. Their dedication and commitment to excellence ensures that we will wholeheartedly continue to support our remaining veterans, commemorate the exploits of 47 Royal Marine Commando and, most importantly, to perpetuate the memory of the 114 men serving with the Commando who made the ultimate sacrifice during the liberation of Europe:

At the going down of the sun
And in the morning,
We will remember them.

(The Association's focus now turns to commemorating Operation Infatuate, the amphibious landings at Walcheren, conducted by 41 RM Cdo, 47 RM Cdo, 48 RM Cdo and No 4 Cdo. This important Corps memorable date will be commemorated at Westkapelle on 1 November - see you all there!)


Normandy Extras

The Mayor was presented with a framed a print of late veteran Ted Battley's painting of the Port during the Festival of the Sea. When a tea towel showing the same print was presented, Patrick joked that the print was really for his wife, Béatrice, and the tea towel for the Mayor.

Asnelles Before the walkers set out from Asnelles bound for Port en Bessin, they attended a ceremony at the monument by the beach. The Mayor of Asnelles and other local dignitaries and people from the locality attended along with our RM Bugler, our Standard and standard bearer, chaplain, John Wasley and Association members.

During the wreath-laying, Norman Rose laid one on behalf of 47 RM Cdo Association and local schoolchildren pinned poppies onto a Union Flag.

St George's School Ingrid received a letter from Lydia Jackson of St George's School, Ascot who is in charge of their trips to France. She enclosed a letter from each girl (32 in all) thanking our veterans for speaking to them about their war experiences. Lydia also enclosed a



donation to the Association of £300 from the school, quite unexpected but very much appreciated, of course.

IN MEMORIAM

We have learned of the death of the following veterans and associates and offer sincere condolences to family and friends:

Ben “Jack” Brooks 30th January 2015, Derbyshire, aged 93.

Jack served in A Troop and on D-Day his landing craft hit a mine. He managed to swim ashore, about a hundred yards, but had to ditch his kit or he would have drowned. So he was one of the many who began the invasion unarmed. He was wounded while in action in Port en Bessin and sent back to hospital in England via an American Field Hospital. Jack rejoined the unit in Walcheren after his recovery and remained with 47 until he was demobbed. Like many, Jack didn't talk much about his service but he was very proud to have been a Royal Marine Commando.

Peter Spear 1st February 2016, Bingley, West Yorkshire, aged 71.

Peter, who died after a long struggle against cancer, was for many years the Vice-Chairman of the Association.

His father was Company Sergeant Major Bill Spear who was killed in Walcheren aged 26 when Peter was about six months old but Peter didn't know that for many years. His mother's house had been bombed and two of his siblings became ill and died so Peter spent some time in a British Seamen's Orphanage. He didn't get on with his step-father, who made him discard all the photos and mementos of his father. Peter eventually changed his name from that of his step-father to Spear.

He worked for 20 years on oil rigs and, no doubt, inherited the courage of his father. On one occasion he saved the lives of three men trapped in high seas on a lower level platform, carrying one man up on his shoulders in gale force winds, against the advice of his boss.

He and Blanche lived in France for about ten years. Capt Peter Winter and Capt Mickie O'Brien would often stay with them, breaking their journey from Spain to Port en Bessin.

Peter was a great help to Secretary, Betty Field when she was less mobile, doing all the running around on trips, especially with regard to getting us through HM Customs at Portsmouth and Dover. He also acted as standard bearer for several years.

For Peter, 47 Cdo became an important part of his life and he was very unhappy that he could no longer take part in activities. However, over the years, he has served 47 RM Commando Association well in a very active and productive way and is much missed for that.

EASTNEY MEMORIALS

Mark Bentinck following mention of our memorial at Eastney in the last issue, kindly got in touch on our behalf with Bob Bruce, former RM Museum Director but now the RM Advisor to the National Museum of the Royal Navy which now incorporates the RM Museum.

In a recent letter, Bob assures us that our monument and those of other units in the Memorial Gardens at Eastney will certainly not be abandoned and continues that the Trustees intend that the Gardens and all the memorials in it should remain in situ and be maintained in perpetuity.

He adds that a final decision cannot be made until plans for the disposal and development of the site are agreed but, “We will, of course, keep the wider Corps Family and all the interested parties involved as things develop.”

A Heritage Lottery Fund grant of £13.87M will enable the RM Museum to move to the Historic Dockyard in Portsmouth (just a step from the Royal Maritime Club) and should open early 2019.



Geof Haywood often goes round and tidies up the wreaths at our memorials when everyone’s gone. (Ex-Sergeant Majors particularly like tidiness, I believe). He found this message and thought our veterans would be pleased to know that they are admired by fellow veterans from France who also took part in bloody battles. A rough translation: “I salute you. I wish you a good commemoration. I’m a veteran of Tunisia, Algeria”



Marc de Bolster sent news of the Dutch Commando Corps (Korps Commando Troepen) which had its origin in No. 2 Dutch Troop 10 Inter Allied Commando. In March they were awarded the highest Dutch military award, the Willemsorde (Order of William) for showing bravery in 170 operations in Afghanistan from 2005 to 2010 in which they had seen 110 battle actions. It was presented by King Willem-Alexander who, during his speech, said that they can measure up to any other special force in the world.

Congratulations to the Corps for a well-deserved award. Members of the Dutch Troop 10 Inter Allied Commando landed and fought with 47 RM Commando in Walcheren and many received bravery awards.
