### **FROM THE CHAIRMAN**

Dear Veterans, friends, families, and Association members far and wide,

Happy New Year!

2017 begins with all surviving veterans of 47 Royal Marine Commando awarded "Legion d'Honneur" by the Republic of France. Some chose to receive their award privately by post, others in person in the UK and still more in France. Being the highest award for gallantry in France, it cannot be awarded twice, so we never saw a parade of ALL 47 Veterans, but we are all very proud to know that they have been awarded. (Reading this if you are a Veteran who has not received yours, please do contact Geof Haywood as soon as you can!)

After the war, 47 Veterans felt that their part in the D Day history had been forgotten. When George Amos visited Port en Bessin in the late 1980s he found the pillbox on the Western Feature was about to be demolished and that many local people thought they had been liberated by the Americans! (The "King Hotel" in P en B has just been renamed the "Eisenhower," so we still have work to do!!)

So to know that the men of 47 have been recognised with the Legion d'Honneur medal - with help of our family members and fabulous committee - is an amazing turnaround in this long history. Even Jerry Brent received his in Australia just weeks before he died.

It is sad to think that many men died since the war without knowing this was coming, but we can be sure that this was the sort of reason the Association was formed - to keep alive the story of what had been achieved.

In the Netherlands in November, a small band of us arrived by coach and car feeling that our numbers were low. But we were reminded that in one year only one WW2 Veteran and Member of the Association - John Baker - was there to represent us all. He was not in 47 RM Commando but he had been on the Arctic Convoys and had served off the coast of Normandy during D Day. As the week wore on, our coach became fuller and fuller and the 47 Standard fluttered proudly with the RM bugler beside. The little church at Dishoek was full with local faces and a warm welcome.

We are contacted all the time by new family members or historians keen to get to meet our Veterans and so the story of 47 goes on. We will all meet again at the Royal Albert Hall in the spring, if you'd like to come along liaise with Geof about booking your own ticket when the rest of us are there ... his allocation has run out already.

I'd like to thank all our Veterans for allowing us to join with you in person or in spirit, and our fabulous committee, standard bearer, padre, buglers, Corps Members, and Association members of all kinds in all countries who make everything possible. The Mayor of Port en Bessin his wife and staff and all the kind people in Fécamp and in Westkapelle do everything they can and Lannah's *Despatch* continues even though she's just moved house from Wales to Scotland, and thanks to her as well.

### WALCHEREN 2016

#### **47 Royal Marine Commando Association Return to Walcheren**

*For those readers a little shy on Corps history, Walcheren is a saucer-shaped island rimmed by high sand-dunes which prevents the sea from flooding the central plain. The island dominates the River Scheldt estuary, which in the Second World War the German Army heavily fortified to prevent the allies gaining access to the vital deep water port of Antwerp. This classic commando sea-borne assault on 1 November 1944 involving 4<sup>th</sup> Special Service Brigade (41 RM Cdo, 47 RM Cdo, 48 RM Cdo and No 4 Cdo) to destroy the formidable enemy coastal batteries was precluded by the RAF bombing the dyke at Westkapelle to flood the interior of the island and deny the enemy freedom of movement. After a hard fought battle along the narrow strip of sand dunes, the island was secured on 8 November.*

Our numbers were as strong as ever when we paraded early but not so bright eyed on a dark but mild autumn morning at the Royal Maritime Club in Portsmouth. After roll-call, expertly overseen by our own highly efficient 'Sergeant Major', Ingrid Fearne (Association Secretary), the thoughts of an uncomfortable and long coach journey were quickly dispelled by the friendly banter, plentiful refreshment and the 'dit' spinning that frequently occurs between the stalwart travelling supporters of the Association and our Second World War veterans, on this occasion represented by Ken Parker, Harry Prescott and Ken Porter.

The historical tone for the visit was further set when we arrived at Calais: a modern day heavily defended coast complete with formidable obstacles, miles and miles of substantial double fences and rows of razor sharp concertina wire. It was commented by our veterans (some of the few to have assaulted Hitler's 'Atlantic Wall' on two occasions in Normandy and at Walcheren) that the European coastline didn't appear to have changed much from 72 years ago! On arrival at the Arneville Hotel in Middleburg, our comfortable patrol base for the 5-day visit, we were enthusiastically welcomed by the staff, along with many of our French, Belgian and Dutch supporters, most of whom had also travelled long distances to be with us to commemorate this special Corps memorable date. During dinner that evening we were joined by Captain Tom Bloor RM and Colour Sergeant Steve Trout, both serving on exchange duties with the RNLMC and who would be formally representing the Corps at the main commemorative ceremonies.

The following day, on 1 November, at the Polderhuis Museum, Westkapelle, we were welcomed by Dr Leon de Witte OBE, President of the Foundation to Support the Liberation

of Walcheren, for the main ceremony and wreath laying at the Liberty Bridge, an impressive wooden structure built by volunteers of the museum in memory of those Royal Marines, attached personnel and other Allied Forces, who were killed in action during the assault and subsequent operations. The bridge connects a Sherman tank on top of the dyke to a landing craft in the museum garden. It represents a lasting homage to all Allied Forces that participated in this successful amphibious operation and the strong links between the Royal Marines and the people of Westkapelle and Walcheren. We then moved to the lighthouse and laid a wreath at the monument for the civil victims of Westkapelle; approximately 200 civilians were killed during the bombing of the dyke, subsequent flooding and during the landings. Following this we all formed up at the Erika beach memorial on the site where No.4 Special Service Brigade landed. At all three ceremonies we were joined by Sir Geoffrey Adams, British Ambassador to the Netherlands, along with senior military and ministerial representatives from France, Belgium, the Netherlands and South Africa. The 47 RM Cdo

Association standard, carried by Lou Sartorel took a prominent position at each ceremony alongside that of the RMA Guildford and District Branch, carried by Tony Davie. The Last Post and Reveille was majestically sounded by Bugler Ross Tomkins from the RM Band Portsmouth.

The next morning we travelled to Dishoek, location of the formidable W11 battery, the main objective of 47 RM Cdo. Much of the sprawling complex was demolished in the 1980s to make way for flood defence improvements. However, in the one the remaining support bunker, a local historian, 'Bunker John' Daane, had built a scale model of the original complex which consisted of four large calibre guns in concrete casements, three anti-aircraft guns, sandbagged machine gun and mortar posts, trenches and nine pillboxes spread out over 600m along the dunes. The chaplain at the local tourist church, Rene Heinric, is the custodian of the 47 RM Cdo memorial plaque listing by name the 34 men who were killed during the amphibious landing and assault on W11. A strong supporter of the Association and especially our veterans, Rene and his team of church helpers always warmly welcome us each year. As a measure of our appreciation, the Association Chaplain, Reverend John Wasley RNR, presented a wooden cross, masterfully crafted from a piece of English Oak, as a token of our everlasting and mutual friendship.

Later that afternoon we visited Flushing, and a long awaited opportunity for 47 RM Cdo Association member Ken Porter, an RN veteran who served with 501 LCA Flotilla at



Normandy and Walcheren, to lay a wreath at the recently rededicated Landing Craft memorial at Uncle Beach. We also paid our formal respects at the No 4 Commando memorial.

Bergen-op-Zoom War Cemetery contains 1284 Commonwealth burials and commemorations of the Second World War, many of the casualties are as a result of the Battle of Walcheren and where most of those killed serving with 47 RM Cdo are laid to rest. During a solemn service conducted by John

Wasley we read out all of the names of those serving with the Commando who were killed at Walcheren and subsequent operations on the River Maas area of operations. We also visited the grave of Lt Ian Adam RM, the sole Commonwealth war grave in the civilian cemetery in Sprang Capelle.

Our last night dinner was a strongly supported affair under our compère and Chairman, the BBC broadcaster and presenter, Paddy O'Connell. It was an opportunity to thank all those who continue to support our veterans and proof that 47 RM Cdo Association remains as strong as ever.

Walcheren was the last major opposed amphibious landing of the Second World War and rightly remains a Corps memorable date. In this often forgotten theatre of operations, the amphibious landings at Westkapelle and subsequent operations around the Western Scheldt and River Maas that saw much desperate hand to hand fighting in awful weather conditions, were the battleground for a free waterway to the liberated city and port of Antwerp and key to



the final liberation of the Netherlands. Winston Churchill, in his account of the Second World War (1954) exulted about Walcheren:

*'Many other notable feats were performed by Commandos during the war, and though other troops and other Services played their full part in this remarkable operation the extreme gallantry of the Royal Marines stands forth, The Commando idea was once again triumphant.'*

### Walcheren Extras

**Marine Guymer** One evening in the hotel, 47 RM Cdo Association historian, Marc de Bolster, told of the tragic death of Marine Arthur Guymer, one of the 114 men who were killed whilst serving with the Commando. Having survived the Normandy landings and action at Walcheren he was killed in Antwerp on 16 December 1944, during a 48-hour leave, when a V-2 rocket landed on the roof of the Cine Rex cinema. There were around 1100 people in the cinema and the explosion killed 567 of them including 296 Allied servicemen (a further 194 service personnel were injured). It was the highest death toll from a single rocket attack during the war. After Marc's presentation, and as our own tribute to Mne Guymer, we watched the entire showing of *'The Plainsman'*, a 1936 US Western starring Gary Cooper and Jean Arthur, which was being shown in the cinema when the rocket hit.

**Zeeland Liberation Museum** On our way back to the hotel, an unexpected opportunity arose to visit the Zeeland Liberation Museum which has the Battle for the River Scheldt as its main theme. We were able to view and get hands-on many of the type of amphibious craft that were used at Walcheren.

**Marine Williams** While in the Sprang Capelle area we were also keen to pay our respects at the grave of Mne David Williams, 41 RM Cdo, whose remains were discovered in 2010 in a



shallow grave a few miles NW of Waalwijk, an area which 41 RM Cdo were responsible for in early 1945. In 2015, a definite identification was made by DNA testing and earlier this year Mne Williams was finally laid to rest in Waspik Protestant Cemetery. Our

bugler, Ross Tomkins, who coincidentally sounded Last Post and Reveille at his funeral service in June, laid a wreath on behalf of 47 RM Cdo Association.

### IN MEMORIAM

*We have learned of the death of the following veterans and offer sincere condolences to family and friends:*

**Gerald Brent** 31<sup>st</sup> July 2016, Point Piper, New South Wales, Australia, aged 95. Gerry was born Gunter Harry Berendt in Berlin in 1920. He managed to get away from Germany to England in 1938 but when war was declared in 1939 he became an "enemy alien" and was interned first in Canada and then on the Isle of Wight. Later he was able to

join the Royal Welch Fusiliers as a Lieutenant. With his fluent German as an asset he transferred to 47 RM Commando. He was instructed to change his name so that he could not be identified as German so he became Gerry Brent. He joined 47 soon after the Walcheren landing but by no means was it all over. He took part in the horrendous battle at Kapelsche Veer and lived to tell the tale. Indeed, his personal account of that time and the barrage, the courage and the loss of life appeared over three issues of *Despatch*. Gerry transferred to No.6 Army Commando and later returned briefly to the Royal Welch. After that regiment's disbandment he was posted to the Rhine Army Headquarters as a Staff Officer with the rank of Captain.

Later, Gerry returned to Australia and ran his own business. Last August, just before his 95<sup>th</sup> birthday, Gerry's son-in-law Bill got in touch, saying he'd like a voice message from me. It seemed a good idea for the Chairman to do the same and Bill phoned us to record our messages and good wishes from all the Association. It was a huge surprise for Gerry at his party and he was thrilled. Almost until the end, he was dealing with emails and other things related to his business.

Gerry will be missed by his friends and family: wife Patricia, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren and, of course, by us. LB

**Leo Kelly** (PO/X105285) 27<sup>th</sup> November 2016, Adelaide, South Australia, aged 95.

Leo was a Corporal in Heavy Weapons Troop with 47 RM Cdo and took part in the Normandy landings. He also landed at Walcheren and often spoke of it because he lost his best mate Jimmy Day as they fought their way ashore. (Marine J E Day, killed in action, 1<sup>st</sup> November 1944).

In 1966 Leo emigrated to South Australia from Liverpool with his wife Marie, who survives him, and four sons. He also leaves eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

In 2005 Leo contributed a poem, "From Gold Beach to Walcheren", to the BBC's 'WW2 People's War' archive. It's reproduced later in this issue.

**Arthur George Baptist** (CH/X 110780) actually died in February 1994 but his son Kenneth recently emailed Marc de Bolster after his mother found various photos and documents.

Arthur served with both 41 and 47 RM Commando up to July 1946. He said that as a signaller he had a side arm rather than a rifle. Earlier, he probably trained with 418 Squad at Lympstone as he had a group photo dated September 1942.

He possibly remained in some arm of the services as he travelled a lot between Holland and Germany until 1950. Arthur was hugely proud to have served as a Commando and missed his friends who never came home. Our thanks to Ken for getting in touch.

**Kell Ryan** Sad to report that Kell, who was a regular walker with Ken Cowdery's group, died recently. ### EASTNEY MEMORIALS

Things remain as before. Mark Bentinck and Bob Bruce, the RM Advisor to the National Museum of the Royal Navy which now incorporates the RM Museum, will keep us informed. Bob has assured us that our monument and those of other units in the Memorial Gardens at Eastney will certainly not be abandoned and the Trustees intend that the Gardens and all the memorials in it should remain in situ and be maintained in perpetuity.

Final decisions cannot be made until plans for the disposal and development of the site are agreed but the wider Corps Family and all the interested parties will be involved as things develop.

The Heritage Lottery Fund grant of £13.87 million will enable the RM Museum to move to the Historic Dockyard in Portsmouth (just a step from the Royal Maritime Club) and should open early in 2019.
