### **Following in the Footsteps of 47 Royal Marine Commando**

Our annual trip to Port-en-Bessin was significant for two reasons this year: it was the first time that the newly established 47 Charity had provided financial support to the 47 Royal Marine Commando Association and also the first time that Major General Rob Magowan CBE, as Commandant General Royal Marines, had visited the port and generously taken time out from his hectic schedule to support our travelling veterans, Chuck Harris, Ken Parker and Harry Prescott.

We are extremely fortunate to have members of the serving Corps in attendance each year. As a token of our appreciation it was an honour to host CGRM at a working breakfast. Also present were the Corps RSM WO1(RSM) Gilby MBE RM, CO Col Scott OBE, RSM WO1(RSM) Roberts RM along with personnel from 1 Assault Group RM, Royal Marines Reserve Honorary Colonel, Col Hatt-Cook OBE RD\*, the CO RMR City of London, Lt Col Turner RM, the RMR RSM WO1(RSM) Campbell RM with other reservist and permanent staff and the Naval Attaché from the British Embassy in Paris, Capt Harris RN. We hope that they not only enjoyed their trip to Port-en-Bessin but also learned much about the history of 47 RM Commando.

This year our programme was as busy as ever. *'Following in the Footsteps of 47 Royal Marine Commando'* is now a well-established annual event on 6 June that retraces the 12-mile route taken by the Commando from Gold Beach to Port-en-Bessin. Serving and former Royal Marines, many British and French friends and families walk the route at a comfortable pace, hearing the story of 47 RM Cdo's mission and actions at specific points along the route. In previous years a regular participant on the walk was Kell Ryan, of the Ryan Air family, who sadly passed away in December. This year his wife Glenis and daughter Sinead were at the unveiling of a memorial to Kell and tree planting ceremony near the start of the walk. It will be a permanent reminder of a good friend and loyal supporter of the Association. Our visit to Bayeux War Cemetery, the final resting place for forty-two of the 47 RM Cdo fallen, was marked by a short service of remembrance, Last Post and wreath laying. The blustery weather conditions meant that many of the wreaths ended up scattered across the cemetery. The Corps RSM gently encouraged many of the local school children in attendance to round up the wreaths and replace them - a nice touch.

Another sad loss this year was veteran Ken Porter, a Royal Navy landing craft coxswain who delivered Canadian troops to Juno Beach on D-Day. Ken regularly travelled with the Association to Port-en-Bessin each year and will be sadly missed. The Association's chaplain, Canon John Wasley RNR, led a short service on Juno Beach where Ken's son, Clive, scattered his dad's ashes at the water's edge. The sombre proceedings were somewhat lightened when a 'rogue' wave caught out many of those attending. It was remarked that it

wasn't the first time that Ken had been responsible for wet feet on Juno Beach! The liberation of Port-en-Bessin is commemorated on 7 June. The first ceremony was at the 47 RM Cdo Memorial Garden on the Western Feature overlooking the harbour. Amidst tight security provided by heavily armed gendarmerie, the service of remembrance was led by John Wasley with Bugler Gareth Evans RM sounding the Last Post and Reveille. The large gathering, including CGRM and serving Royal Marines then transferred to the Captain Cousins Memorial on the

Eastern Feature for a similar service. Captain Cousins is recognised as playing the decisive role in the battle of Port-en-Bessin; he was killed as he led his troop in the final charge against a heavily defended German bunker, which resulted in the surrender of the enemy and the capture of the port. A further ceremony followed in Place Gaudin and an opportunity to also pay tribute to the crews of the French cruisers Montcalm and Georges Leygues which supported Allied Landings at Omaha beach.

The following reception and events were further opportunities to strengthen the warm friendship between veterans, their families and friends and the community. The popular



historic vehicle parade through Port-en-Bessin, organised by Marc de Bolster, included living history re-enactors in WW2 military dress. Outside 'Le 47ème Commando' bar, renamed in honour of the Commando, we were entertained by singers and later the 'Band of Brothers' jazz ensemble performing music of WW2. The 'Bootneck Shuffle' was very much in evidence and a good time was had by all.

The following day we visited the 4<sup>th</sup> Special Service Brigade memorial at Sallenelles. Dr Christian Kottler was our kind host in the garden of Maison Cheigny where the Regimental Aid Post had been located during the defence of the River Orne bridgehead.

Our end of visit traditional Association dinner in the 47 Commando bar was the usual enjoyable and raucous affair that lasted well into the night.

So ended another successful visit to Normandy which would not have been possible without the help of so many people. In particular a special thanks to Ingrid Fearn, our excellent Secretary; Geof Haywood, Master of Ceremonies; Ken Cowdery, commemorative march director; Lou Sartorel and Les Pike, standard bearers; Canon John Wasley RNR, chaplain; Paddy O'Connell, linguist, raconteur and Chairman and Allen Withington, owner of the Willy's jeep utilised as CGRM's taxi! Last but not least a big thank you to all our sponsors. Their donations will ensure that we will continue to support our veterans and commemorate the high achievement of 47 RM Cdo.

General Horrocks, Commander XXX Corps during the Normandy campaign summed it up: *'It is doubtful whether in their long, distinguished history the Royal Marines have ever achieved anything finer.'*

## Normandy Extras

### Chuck Harris

Jacqueline Hearn, Chuck's daughter, wrote about one personal highlight of the many events during this year's Normandy trip:

"Meeting a Belgian couple, by chance, who we had met a few years previously, they asked us was Dad "Chuck Harris". After saying he was, they told us the French gentleman at the B&B where they were staying told them that his father (who had died a few years ago) had a piece of paper from the war with Chuck Harris and Captain Cousins written on it.

We went to see the gentleman and he told us that his father had met them very early one morning during the war. We went to a farmhouse just down a track and met the gentleman's brother and family and they were amazed that Chuck Harris was still alive and spoke of that night during the war. They said that Dad and Captain Cousins were doing a recce of the area and realising, after a while, they were not German, let them in and helped them study

Captain Cousins' map on the table. They told them where the Germans actually were, all before the assault on Port en Bessin. This could have been vital to the attack. They also treated a wound on Dad's arm by pouring Calvados on it. They told us more details of that night, obviously remembered by the family from their father.

Dad was so pleased to meet them and likewise them with Dad. They opened a good bottle of champagne in his honour. The Belgian couple were very good translators for us all. We all took many photographs and Dad signed a photograph of their grandson. Unbeknown to us, we had met him last year when his school in Port en Bessin put on a show for the Veterans and Dad had signed his tee-shirt which we also saw in the farmhouse. They were all so proud to be together in the same farmhouse after all these years and so were we.

It was such a chance meeting and such a happy event that I had to write about it.”

### **St George's School, Ascot**

It's become a tradition that we meet with the third year girls on their school trip to Normandy. As before, they were pleased to lay their tributes and to talk with the veterans. Lydia Jackson, the history teacher who organises and leads the trips, has written to Ingrid to thank her for arranging a suitable time and also quoted a letter from a parent, very satisfied with their whole trip, which includes the following: “Aliya really enjoyed herself and it was such a positive and moving experience for her. She absolutely loved meeting the veterans on D-Day, having the opportunity to speak to these gentlemen was a true privilege and something that will stay with her forever”.

## **IN MEMORIAM**

*We have learned of the death of the following veterans and offer sincere condolences to family and friends:*

**Roger Alan Dobson** (PO/X111805) 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2017, Ipswich, aged 92.

Roger, also known as Dobbie, was a Lieutenant who served in both A and Q Troops. In June 1944 he worked in the docks and witnessed 47 Commando embarking for Normandy and had a brief word with one of the men. He immediately decided to volunteer for Commando training. In March 1945 he was assigned to 47 and joined them in Holland. He actually recognised the man he had spoken to as Sgt Mark Packer (A Troop). He arrived after Kapelsche Veer so believed he could take no particular credit as he didn't see any action other than patrolling the banks of the River Maas, nevertheless he served from then onwards through the difficult period when 47 helped to bring order to a disintegrated Europe.

Marc de Bolster visited Dobbie when he made contact with the Association and found him to be a gentle and kind man, proud to have been a member of 47 RM Commando.

**Donald John Clark** (PO/X 111778) 9<sup>th</sup> March 2017, Stratford upon Avon, aged 92.

Don, better known to his comrades as Nobby, served in HQ Troop. Like many, he added a year to his age in order to volunteer. After the rigorous commando training, he landed with 47 in Normandy and remained throughout the Normandy campaign. Later Nobby landed in Walcheren where he was wounded. After convalescence, he was on board ship bound for Japan when news of their surrender came through. The ship continued and brought back prisoners of war.

Don returned to Stratford after demob and worked for the Government, retiring as a Building Inspector. He received a medal for long service from the Queen and also, more recently, the

Legion d'Honneur from France.

War service coloured Don's life and he always insisted that the true heroes were those brave men who never returned.

**Kenneth William Stanley Porter** 29<sup>th</sup> April 2017, Bristol, aged 92.

Ken joined the Royal Navy and became a Landing Craft Crewman on HMS *Invicta*. On D-Day his landing craft along with five others landed Canadian troops on Juno Beach. Their orders were to run in as fast as possible and not stop to pick up casualties. This they did, having to ignore those in the water, returning to *Invicta* several times for more Canadians. After this they returned to Weymouth and continued to ferry people to the beaches, including some American nurses.

On November 1<sup>st</sup> 1944 Ken's landing craft landed 4 Commando troops onto the heavily defended beach at Vlissingen (Flushing) in Walcheren. Much later in life he joined 47 RM Cdo Association and has been a staunch supporter revisiting both Normandy and Walcheren. After the war Ken worked for British Rail for forty years and achieved that schoolboy dream of driving a steam locomotive. He will be missed by family and friends, including those in the Association.

### THE RM MOUNTBATTEN FESTIVAL of MUSIC March 2017

Once again Veterans, Members and Guests headed to the Royal Albert Hall London for this the annual Massed Bands of Her Majesty's Royal Marines (RMB) Concert.

*The proceeds are in aid of the Royal Marine Charity and the CLIC Sargent fund set up in memory of Sir Malcolm Sargent once an Honorary Musical Advisor to the RMB to care for young people with cancer. The concert was renamed "The Mountbatten Concert" in honour of Earl Mountbatten of Burma who was the Life Colonel Commandant RM after his death in 1979 by an IRA bomb.*

### **MORE NEWS**

**Michel Désérable** Ingrid asked Michel to keep her updated about his pending heart operation. He wrote to tell her that it had been successful and he felt much better. He was helped in his recovery by his dear friend Heike from Germany. They will both stay in Domburg in November when he or, better still, perhaps both of them will join us for the Walcheren commemorations. Our best wishes to Michel for continuing good health.

**Jaco Van 'tNoordende** Jaco, one of our Dutch members, had planned to make parachute jumps on 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> June over US Drop Zones in Normandy before coming to Port en Bessin on the 6<sup>th</sup>. When he arrived in Cherbourg on Sunday the 4<sup>th</sup>, there were no places left. The following day the weather was fine and calm, looking ideal for jumping. Arrived at Cherbourg and all geared up, the wind picked up and everything was cancelled. It's dangerous to jump from 3000 feet in 40 kph (c25 miles per hour) and land in 30 kph (c20 mph). Despite this, Jaco had a great time on the Drop Zone. At first he had trouble getting his head around American accents. Fortunately, he met two Brits. One of them said he had a North Country accent but it seems Jaco could cope with that better than American English which, at first, he didn't recognise as English at all! He arrived in the Port in time to take part in the walk once again which he thoroughly enjoyed.

**Ann Hughes** I received an email from Ann's family to tell of her sudden death in April. Just a few members may remember her on Normandy trips. She and her late husband Peter regularly came to Normandy in June, staying with their son, Dominic, a BBC correspondent who lived nearby at that time. Peter, the son of a Royal Marine NCO, did his National Service with the Royal Marines from about 1951 and was invalided out a year or so later with back problems. This was a severe blow to him as he hoped to remain with the Corps after his National Service. He remained loyal to the Corps all his life and also became a staunch supporter of 47 RM Commando.

**Heather Johnson** who joined 47 members at the Royal Albert Hall this year, began archiving material, originally held by our late President, Prof John Forfar, for the Royal Marines Museum. This has become part of the National Museum of the Royal Navy and



Heather is now their National Archives Officer. As she works her way through, she has been sending photographs to Marc de Bolster, Geof Haywood and me, in the hope that we would be able to supply some unknown names. So far we have managed this between us but it's possible that in future we may include some in *Despatch* to see if any members can help out.

### **Eastney RM Museum and Memorials**

The public galleries of the Royal Marines Museum closed on 1<sup>st</sup> April although some other activities continue on the premises such as meetings of the RM Historical Society. It is part of the ongoing plan for the Seamore project whereby the RM Museum moves to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard near HMS Victory and HMS Warrior. It will ultimately run alongside and as part of the National Museum of the Royal Navy's new Centre for Discovery and Royal Marines Museum.

There is a grant of £15M from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the move and much of the other expenditure involved but the Corps needs to raise a further £2.5M to make the scheme work. There is now an appeal for funds throughout the Corps, "Make History for the Royal Marines". Details at [www.royalmarinesmuseum.co.uk/make-history](http://www.royalmarinesmuseum.co.uk/make-history).

Major Bob Bruce RM, Chairman of the Friends of the RM Museum, has an article about the appeal in the current *Globe & Laurel*. He has already assured us that we will be kept up-to-date regarding the fate of our memorial to the fallen of 47 RM Cdo and those of other units in the Memorial Gardens at Eastney.

**Ernie Taylor** We learned the sad news that Ernie, a veteran of 48 RM Cdo has died at the age of 93. He lived in Holland with his Dutch partner, Riet. Some people may remember him from when we have met up with 48 in Walcheren, particularly at Zouteland, where the RN put a hole in the church roof in November 1944. It's sad to report the loss of another fine commando.

### **VE DAY DINNER, Saturday 13th May 2017**
